Thank you for your letter requesting our Party's stance on issues important to your organization. Below are parts of our platform that I hope will be of interest to your membership.

1. What is the New Democratic Party's position on the use of non-renewable resource benefits to help develop long term socio-economic sustainability through the knowledge based industry?

Access to high speed internet is essential for educational and business success now. Our platform includes a commitment to ensuring that all communities have access to high-speed internet.


